CHAIR'S REPORT



2021 has continued to be a challenging year for businesses, projects and our communities. For the Foundation it has been a year of mixed results as we celebrate the successes of our work locally, we also acknowledge the challenges our partners in Uganda are facing as the pandemic continues to impact daily life.

In 2020 the Board had to make the difficult decision to cancel our annual immersion trip and instead focus on supporting the 12 school communities that participate in the Uganda Landcare Opportunities Project as they navigate lockdowns and closure of schools.

Whilst the Foundation would typically look to extend support of the Uganda Landcare Opportunities Project each year, 2021 shifted focus with priority given to ensuring existing sites were supported to be ready to resume operation when lockdowns are lifted. I thank our project partner Uganda Landcare Network and Australia Landcare International for their work and commitment to supporting communities across the Masaka district during this period.

At home I am delighted to report that the Northern Opportunities program is well into its' second year of operation with 31 Salisbury High School students in Years 9 and 10 now participating. Congratulations to our first cohort of students, now in Year 10 that have graduated from the first year of the program having completed the mentoring module with Raise Foundation and now also the Year 10 leadership skills workshops with Youth Opportunities. By 2024, we expect that up to 80 students will participate in this program each year.

I would like to extend my gratitude to our Corporate Partner Kain Lawyers for their financial and hands-on commitment to the Northern Opportunities program, providing the opportunity for their team to create meaningful opportunities for change for students through mentoring and our PrepMe work ready workshops.

I would also like to thank Kain Lawyers, and in particular Sarah Chia and Sara Ucci, who have provided project management and implementation support to our local and overseas projects respectfully. This was done following the retirement of our former Executive officer Lisa Tarca.

As a result of the improved financial position of the Foundation and the growing commitments of our Northern Opportunities initiative, we have employed Clare Randall as Executive Officer of the Foundation to support the growth and development of our Northern Opportunities and Uganda Landcare Opportunities projects. Clare brings a range of experiences and networks across government, non-government and philanthropy industries and will be a real asset to the Foundation as we scale and grow our projects.

I would also like to acknowledge the trust and support of Salisbury High School and partner schools in Uganda who have welcomed our support, ideas and programs into their communities. Without our Community Partners we would not be able to make a meaningful and lasting change for children and young people.

Finally, I thank our Board: Mark Booth, Andrew Killey, Jan Turbill and Evan Polymeneos. Each have generously invested much time during this and prior years. Despite our COVID driven setbacks in Uganda, we are now seeing genuine progress in our Northern Opportunities Program which is a testament to the foresight of our board which conceived this project in 2017.

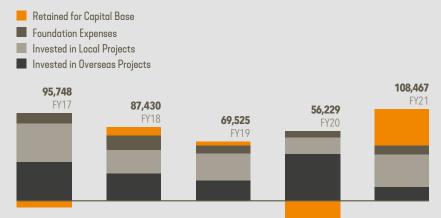
THE YEAR IN REVIEW (JULY 2020 – JUNE 2021)

IN FY21 THE FOCUS WAS ON IMPLEMENTING OUR NORTHERN OPPORTUNITIES PROJECT LOCALLY AND SUPPORTING OUR COMMUNITY PARTNERS OVERSEAS NAVIGATE AND RESPOND TO THE IMPACTS OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC.

Through the year we concentrated on:

- ensuring our projects would deliver positive long-term outcomes for children and young people;
- working with our Corporate and Community Partners locally to implement the Northern Opportunities project, supporting young people at Salisbury High School to build their economic and educational capacity through wrap-around supports; and
- working with our overseas Community Partners to navigate the changes of supporting children and young people during the pandemic, and supporting schools during lockdown.

INTERNATIONAL V. LOCAL PROJECT INVESTMENTS (FY17-FY21)



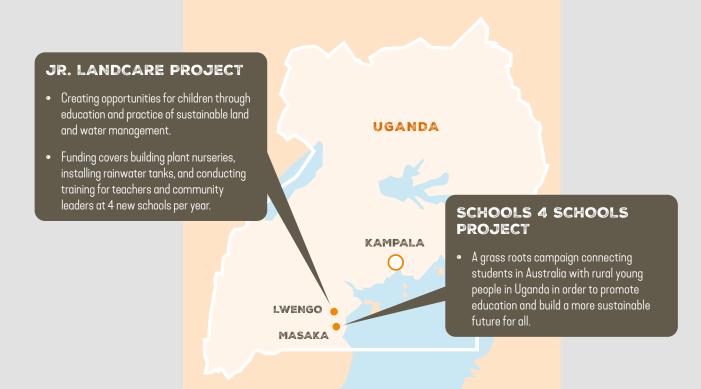

YOUTH OPPORTUNITIES

In semester 2, 2020 our traditional scholarship partnership with Youth Opportunities came to an end with the provision of scholarships for a laptop or driving lessons to a further 6 students at Salisbury High School. This project has been subsumed into the Year 11 and Year 12 modules of the Foundation's new-look Northern Opportunities initiative.

NORTHERN OPPORTUNITIES

Last financial year the Foundation, together with our supporting partners, launched our revised Northern Opportunities initiative at Salisbury High School. The initiative is a targeted 4-year program, starting in Year 9, that supports the economic and educational development of students through the participation in mentoring, leadership and life skill trainings, scholarships and work experience.

FY21 saw our first cohort of students complete the mentoring module in year 9 through project partner Raise Foundation, before taking part in Youth Opportunities leadership and life-skills workshops in Year 10.

Through these components students learnt to improve their communication skills, identify and form goals and recognise positive role models and mentors with participants reporting:

- increased connection with school;
- increased attendance and class engagement;
- improved optimism and happiness;
- increased wellbeing.

In January 2021 the second cohort of 16 Year 9 students commenced the program with a visit to Kain Lawyers before starting the mentoring program in May.

By FY23, the Foundation will have 60 young people participating in the project.

Over the course of the 4-year program students will take part of the following modules designed to empower them to fulfill their human potential:

Year 9 - Mentoring

The first year of the program is designed to equip young people with the skills to navigate challenges, identify goals and connect with positive mentors and role models. This kicks off with a visit to Adelaide CBD for students to meet the participating corporate partner[s] and familiarise them with city sites before commencing mentoring through project partner Raise Foundation in Term 2.

Students then meet with their mentor for 1 hour per week over 23 weeks, assisting them to develop their communication skills, connection with school and equip them with tools to help them navigate life's challenges.

As part of the Northern Opportunities program the Foundation offers the opportunity for Corporate Partners to get involved in this stage of the program as mentors and works with Raise to provide comprehensive training to those that wish to be involved.

Year 10 - Leadership and life skills

In Year 10, students are supported to complete Youth Opportunities 10-week leadership skills workshop and keep connected with others in the program through regular lunchtime catch-ups and activities.

In semester 1, 2021 the first Northern Opportunities cohort participated in these workshops, increasing their confidence, self-believe and motivation whilst building their capacity to develop lifelong skills, habits and confidence to thrive.

Those students that participate in the Year 10 module are then eligible for scholarships to reduce the barriers to and support their learning.

Year 11 - Employability skills and scholarships

Through Year 11 students are able to visit workplaces and learn about different career paths through the Foundation's PrepMe workshops, plus build their financial literacy skills.

In preparation for FY22 when the first cohort of students will participate in this module, the Foundation worked with Salisbury High School and Corporate Partner Kain Lawyers to test the program with Year 10 EALD students through 2021.

The first workshop was a great hit, providing students with the opportunity to visit a workplace, get involved in activities to expand their understanding of what's required in a workplace and visit TafeSA. The Foundation thanks Salisbury High School and Kain Lawyers for working with us to offer this opportunity.

Year 12 - Scholarship and work experience

In the final year of the program the Foundation aims to offer paid short-term employment for students to assist them towards social and economic independence, in addition to offering scholarships to reduce barriers to pursuing their chosen careers.

OVERSEAS: UGANDA

UGANDA LANDCARE OPPORTUNITIES PROJECT

Our projects in Uganda have been severely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic during FY21. The country-wide lockdown announced on 15th March 2020 was in effect for most of 2020.

Even when lockdown started to ease schools remained closed with candidate classes starting under restricted rule from November 15, 2020. Upper classes, the cohort the Junior Landcare Project is targeted at didn't resume until early 2021 and ceased operation again a few months later under a second lockdown instruction.

In December 2020 the Foundation received a report from ULN assessing the impacts of the COVID pandemic on the Junior Landcare Program in schools. The report provided a detailed overview of the challenges and status of the program and infrastructure from each school.

A decision was made to not introduce new schools to the project in 2021 or pilot a microfinance offering, but instead focus on supporting the existing sites return to operation and the path of sustainability.

Between lockdowns our project partner, Uganda Landcare Network, worked with school communities to fix broken infrastructure and purchase masks for students in the program.

As per the needs assessment, the Foundation worked with ULN to commence the installation of additional water tanks at the participating schools to provide adequate water for drinking, increased hygiene requirements and watering of the tree nurseries.

Unfortunately much of this work has been delayed as Uganda entered its' second lockdown in June 2021.

The Foundation acknowledges the hard work of ULN and the participating schools over FY21 and looks forward to continuing to support these communities in FY22.

UGANDA IMMERSION TRIP

Due to Australia's border closures and the changing COVID-19 situation overseas, the Foundation's annual immersion trip was cancelled in FY21. We look forward to resuming these experiences when the impacts of the pandemic have lessened.

The Foundation was established in 2005 as a trust (ABN 63 425 376 446). Kain Charities Pty Limited (ACN 115 024 309) is the trustee of the Foundation. The Foundation is a Public Ancillary Fund that has been endorsed by the Australian Taxation Office as a Deductible Gift Recipient, and as a registered charity with the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission. Monetary donations of \$2 or more to the Foundation are tax deductible.

Board

Kain Lawyers Pty Limited (ACN 137 053 395) is the sole shareholder of Kain Charities Pty Limited and has appointed a board of directors in accordance with the Foundation's governance policies and the Australian Taxation Office's requirements for public ancillary funds. As the name suggests, John is the Founder of the Foundation as well as the Adelaidebased legal firm Kain Lawyers. John initiated the Uganda Project in 2009, which is now in its eleventh year.

In addition to his work as a teacher, Evan volunteers for The Barefoot Initiative –a grassroots community development project working with the Afar people in Ethiopia.



FINANCIAL REPORT

OUR CORPORATE PARTNERS INVEST SIGNIFICANT TIME AND FINANCIAL RESOURCES INTO THE FOUNDATION. THE FOUNDATION IS ACUTELY AWARE OF THE GREAT TRUST BESTOWED BY OUR CORPORATE PARTNERS TO ENSURE THAT THEIR FINANCIAL RESOURCES ARE DIRECTED TO MAXIMISE IMPACT WHEN CREATING OPPORTUNITIES FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE IN NEED.

In the first decade of the Foundation's history the Board aimed to keep administration costs to a minimum with an expense ratio target not to exceed 5% of contributions received. After a review of best practice for other NGO's operating locally and internationally, along with a strategic realignment of the Foundation, the Board agreed to an expense target of no more than 20%.

Whilst our overall expenses increased in FY21 we were able to keep well below our expense target due to the increase in cash contributions and generous in-kind project management support from Corporate Partner Kain Lawyers, with expenses totalling 9.88% of funds raised and 19.31% of funds distributed.

Due to COVID-19 impacts, our projects in Uganda ceased operation for most of FY21, resulting in lower than projected activity. Whilst our work overseas slowed, our new-look local project, Northern Opportunities commenced and contributions across both projects will grow in coming years.

FY21 saw the Foundation return to profit, resulting in nearly \$43K being retained for capital base. The Foundation expects that contributions from our Corporate Partners will continue to grow over coming years.

During FY21, the Foundation invested \$16.9K in our Uganda Landcare Opportunities project and \$38K on our local Northern Opportunities Initiative. The local program contributions were:

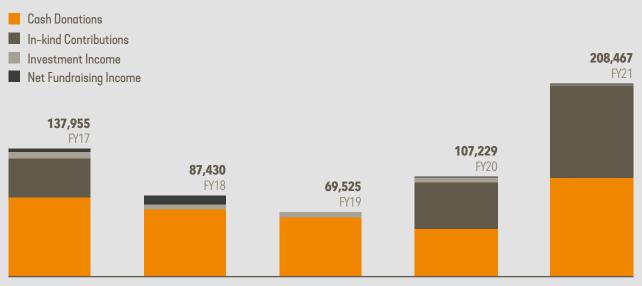
- \$18k to Youth Opportunities Personal Leadership and Scholarships Programs; and
- \$20k to Raise Foundation's Mentoring program.

INCOME BY SOURCE

The Foundation's principle source of funding is donations from Corporate Partners (both cash and in-kind support). As projected, Corporate Partner income from Kain Lawyers increased in FY21, and is projected to continue this trajectory in FY22.

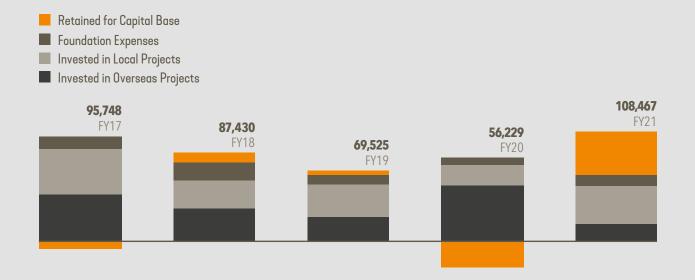

The chart below shows Projects, expenses and retained income over the last 5 years:



Funds raised are either invested in projects, used to pay expenses, or retained by the Foundation. The Foundation categorises its use of funds in four ways:

- as an investment in projects within 12 months of funds being raised. The Foundation typically invests at least 65% of the cash donations it receives directly into projects in the same year that the funds are collected.
- as an investment in long-term multi-year projects where funds are invested more than 12 months after the funds were raised.
- to meet operational expenses.
- retained as permanent capital to generate income to meet future project commitments and expenses.

In FY21 the Foundation retained a larger sum than originally anticipated largely due to COVID-19 impacts in Uganda leading to the closure of schools and restricted movement across the country for large periods during the year.
